IF NOT NOW, WHEN?

A NEW VISION FOR JEWISH EDUCATION AT TI

A love and respect for education has always been one of the defining points of the Jewish people. Yet we know that when it comes to Jewish education, it can often be a challenge to excite and engage people to the degree that is necessary to produce informed, educated Jewish learners of all ages. For young people, especially, the rigors of secular education combined with the busyness of extracurricular activities mean that religious education ends up taking a back seat. So how can we make sure that our educational programming for students of all ages is everything we want it to be?

This is a question that has been on our minds for as long as we can remember, yet we both approach the subject from different perspectives. Rabbi Alper often shares with his students his own memories from Hebrew School. He was notorious for jumping out of the windows in his classroom out of boredom. However, he always loved learning and teaching, and in his days as a public school teacher in the Bronx, he made sure to provide his students with unique experiential learning opportunities that were designed to fit the individual needs and interests of his students.

Rabbi Feder grew up at Temple Israel during the period of time when our congregation did not offer Hebrew School. She fondly remembers sitting around the dining room table at Carol Rubin's house



preparing for her bat mitzvah. She always loved Sunday School (and many of her favorite teachers are still at TI!), but got to college and realized just how little she actually knew about the Jewish faith.

Though our individual experiences with Jewish education growing up were vastly different, the end result was the same. We are both passionate about Jewish education and are committed to making learning at Temple Israel enjoyable, substantive and meaningful for all ages. To this end we have been meeting with other dedicated and enthusiastic parents, teachers, and staff to create a new vision for education at TI.

We know that our congregation is a *Beit Kneset* (House of Gathering), a *Beit Tefillah* (House of Worship), and a *Beit Midrash* (House of Learning). We believe that our educational programs should encompass all three of those aspects as well. Our school should be a place where people of all ages can build community, achieve a sense of spirituality through prayer, and increase their Jewish knowledge.

Our core values for Jewish education at Temple Israel are that learning should be multi-generational, flexible, experiential, and personal.

Why multi-generational? We believe that our educational programming must begin with the enthusiasm of our youngest students, and continue with a thread that connects all generations at points throughout their lives.

A love of Judaism must be instilled in our youngest children and echoed again throughout Religious School and into Adult Education. When possible, educational programming should encompass multiple generations, age groups and levels of learners. Older students should be given the opportunity to serve as leaders, mentors and teachers for younger students.

Why flexible? As we've learned through the success of our DECC preschool program, flexibility is key to engaging and attracting people to our congregation. Multiple pathways to learning must be created and supported to respond to the busy and multifaceted lives of our congregants. This means that flexibility should be offered in terms of times and dates whenever possible. We should also be flexible in addressing skill levels and ages to ensure that the needs of all types of learners are met, regardless of age and ability. The individual needs of congregants will always be heard and given appropriate consideration to ensure that all who want to learn have the opportunity to do so.

Why experiential learning? Learning should be fun! Sitting passively in a classroom can no longer be the norm. We want to embrace an active process that engages learners and encourages greater meaning and relevancy. Focus should be placed on multi-sensory education outside the confines of a traditional, four-walled classroom whenever possible. Incidental and intentional learning should be enhanced through an increased focus on retreats, *chavurot* and trips. The value of informal Jewish educational programs, like Youth Groups, should be increased. *Tikkun Olam* should be integrated into learning whenever possible, as should enjoyable, active worship. Hebrew should be brought to life and integrated as part of a single Jewish educational model rather than separated into a different school program.

Why personal? We know that the most meaningful moments in our lives are ones when we feel personally connected to our community. Temple Israel is dedicated to creating a culture and a community that is warm and welcoming. We are a family of families and a gathering place where all are invited to learn and rejoice.

In the months to come, we will be sending out a survey with questions about your interests, needs, and concerns regarding education. Please look for it and take a few minutes to respond. We are counting on your input to help us continue to make our educational programs great!

DEUTSCH EARLY CHILDHOOD CENTER OF TEMPLE ISRAEL

It is hard to believe that it is August and camp is over, and the start of a new school year is right around the corner. Fall is all about new beginnings. That is why I am so excited to tell you about a new community-wide program that is about to be launched here at Temple Israel. As some of you recall, I was awarded a \$5,000 incubator grant from the Union for Reform Judaism to create a Jewish Parents as Teachers (JPAT) program. I have also received additional funding for this program from a family education grant from the Gladys K. Crown Foundation honoring the Memory of Shirlee Green and the Rich Fund of the Jewish Federation of St. Louis.

To officially launch the program, we will host a JPAT kick-off event for the community on Monday, Sept. 12, at 4:00 p.m. here at Temple Israel. Like Missouri Parents as Teachers, JPAT will provide families with children from birth to age 3 with three home visits by a certified parent educator, developmental screenings, information and resources about child development, and with moral support. We will also offer group parent education sessions and group playtime for families. What will distinguish JPAT from Missouri's Parents as Teachers is our Judaic content, which is being developed by the St. Louis Central Agency for Jewish Education.

I have hired Eve Lerner Rudolph to direct this new program. She has taught for Ladue Early Childhood for 15 years and was the Director of Ladue School District's Before and After School Program (BASK). Eve will ensure that JPAT is a community success.

JPAT will fill a void in the community created by state funding cuts to the Missouri Parents as Teachers program. We will provide the same quality programming while also

giving families Jewish educational resources to enrich their lives and to empower them to become more active in the Jewish community. The cost to enroll in JPAT is \$125 per child, per year.

JPAT will increase Jewish parents' confidence, enabling them to give their children the very best possible start in life.

JPAT will introduce families to developmentally-appropriate Jewish observances in the home.

JPAT will connect young Jewish families to resources in the Jewish community and encourage enrollment in Jewish preschools, such as our DECC.

JPAT will increase parents' knowledge of child development and show them appropriate ways to stimulate learning.

JPAT will give a child a solid foundation for school success.

JPAT will provide a means for early detection of potential learning issues.

JPAT will give a child a strong foundation for Jewish learning.

Our TI and DECC families have done so much to help us create such a successful preschool. I know you will do the same for JPAT. Educating Jewish children and families is what we do the very best! Thank you for your continued support.

TIFTY

TEMPLE ISRAEL FEDERATION OF TEMPLE YOUTH TIFTY ADVISORS BID FAREWELL

Nine years ago, when we were still known as the “Schultz sisters,” we were sitting at home when the phone rang and Rabbi (Amy) Bigman was on the other end. She told us that the Temple was in need of someone to “fill in” while they interviewed for new (youth group) advisors. After working with the kids, we thought this might be something we’d like to do for a few years, as it brought back the fond memories of our youth group days. After interviewing with the youth committee and several kids, we signed on for a job. Looking back, nine years later, we have so many memories of the great times we’ve shared with our TIFTY friends.

In over nine years, about 200 kids have been active in TIFTY. With these amazing kids we’ve planned nine Purim Carnivals, chaperoned over 40 regional Chavurot, five of which were planned by TIFTY (and three of those won Chavurah of the year) and held nearly 30 lock-ins. TIFTY was awarded most improved Temple Youth Group (TYG) and TYG of the year, and has won many other awards for programming, social action, membership and fundraising. We collected 1.5 million crayons to create a permanent memorial at TI for those children who died in the Holocaust, and planned over a dozen fundraisers for Camp Rainbow raising over \$30,000 for the camp. We’ve helped with every High Holy Day toiletry drive and held an all-youth group mitzvah day program each year—and in total, we’ve donated close to 400 bears to the Hanukkah Hugs program. We’ve also held smaller programs, like making bracelets out of melted tooth brushes, spray painting tshirts, and tie-dyeing over and over—until we got it just right.

All of these events have helped make for great experiences. But it’s not what really makes a youth group memorable.

The moments that we'll take away and remember are times like when we hid under a table at the Edison Retreat Center while a bat flew overhead and we all screamed below; or projecting a service of movie clips onto the ceiling because we couldn't find a flat wall to watch it on; or bringing the kids to our workplaces to take a tour of "The Fed" and teach lessons to first graders on conflict; or staying up into the early hours of the morning at a lock-in, talking about whatever is on our TIFTYites minds; or looking around the circle during silent prayer of a Friday night TIFTY service and seeing every eye closed, deep in prayer and thought. Yes, it's those moments and hundreds more like them, that we'll remember and always treasure.

But truth be told, we haven't done this alone. We have been lucky to work with four Rabbinic liaisons who have guided us and supported TIFTY. In the past few years, we've been lucky to work with Stephanie Rhea and get to build our friendship.

There have been many volunteers and parents who have helped throughout the years in many ways. But when we look back, a few wonderful people stand out and have been with us since day one. Our youth chairs, Diane Packman and Lynne Lippmann, have had our backs, volunteering at any time of day or night, no task too big or small. And then there's the "Temple ladies," Gale Hilburg, Sydney Masin, and Judy Lewis, and of course, their husbands. They're the ones over the years to always jump up and ask, "What can I do to help?" They come early to help set up, they stay late to help clean up, and they never



let us down. They are also great lunch buddies. And no "thank you" would be complete without the mention of our family. Doug and our parents have chaperoned, driven, dog-sat Mitzi, shopped, ran the kitchen at Purim, picked up bagels countless times, dealt cards at Poker night, and anything else we've ever needed. They work our family schedules around our TIFTY schedule, never complaining, and always supportive.

And a few words to all our TIFTYites, past and present. Thanks for all the wonderful memories and for sharing your lives with us. We've enjoyed watching you grow and change through high school. We've loved keeping in touch with past TIFTYites as they go through college, get married, and even come back to TI. We hope you all get much out of your time in TIFTY and go on to be the successful Jewish leaders of the future. And we'll be able to say, "we

knew you when..." We've spent much of the last few weeks looking back at our time with TIFTY. And now, we look forward - forward to finding our own new place at TI, our lifelong home; forward to finding new things to fill our time. It is time for this chapter in our lives to close. This is not goodbye - we will still be here teaching and being a part of this community. So, for now, it's not good-bye, but *L'hitraot*, see you soon.

REMEMBERING COMMUNITY LEADER RONNI HANDELMAN

Editor's Note: The two articles that follow are part of our periodic TI Cares series of profiles on congregants who made a difference in our community as well as our congregation.

Ronni Handelman, professional volunteer and passionate advocate for social justice, lost a five-year battle with non-smoker's lung cancer Friday, May 13. She was 62. Her funeral service was Sunday, May 15, at Congregation Temple Israel. She was buried at Mt. Sinai Mausoleum.

A licensed clinical social worker, Handelman used her educational training to make significant contributions as a volunteer leader for many St. Louis organizations. She was particularly interested in raising funds for Israel, a country that gained its independence in 1948, the year she was born.

Compassion for others was key to her voluntarism. Whether she was hosting foreign visitors, raising money, building bridges between diverse communities or initiating exciting new programs, Handelman made the task a pleasure and always did it with a smile.

"Nothing stopped Ronni from rolling up her sleeves and doing what needed to be done," said Karen Kalish, co-founder with Handelman of St. Louis Cultural Leadership. "She repeatedly demonstrated that she had a deep sense of social responsibility and was committed to social action." Handelman helped Kalish launch Cultural Leadership, an educational leadership program in St. Louis for African American and Jewish teens, and succeeded her as Chair of its Board.

A proud Lion of Judah, Handelman served as President of the Jewish Federation's Women's Division (now Women's Connection), and as vice president of the Jewish Federation Board. She was a member of the National Women's Board of United Jewish Communities (now Jewish Federations of North America), vice president of the Jewish Community Relations Council (JCRC), and chaired the Government Relations Office of the Missouri Jewish Federations.

"Ronni was always wholly engaged and wonderfully effective," said Batya Abramson-Goldstein, JCRC's executive director. "Her compassion for others was expressed through her outstanding service as chair of the JCRC Refugee relief Effort and the JCRC International Human Rights Committee."

Handelman was a board member of St. Louis Hillel and a member of the National Hillel Board of Directors. She was a member of the African American/Jewish Task Force of St. Louis, was the president of the Board of the American Jewish Committee (1996-99) and went on several missions to Israel and Russia.

Handelman was honored on many occasions for her contributions to the community. She was chosen as a Woman of Achievement in 2007 for her commitment to social responsibility. She received the Netzach Award from the American Jewish Committee with her niece Patty Bloom, and the Brotherhood/Sisterhood Award from the National Conference for Community and Justice.

"The passing of Ronni Handelman is an enormous personal and communal loss," said Barry Rosenberg, executive vice president of Jewish Federation. "For decades Ronni provided warm, inspired, energetic and selfless leadership to the Jewish and larger community. Her reach was enormous and her impact was monumental."

She was the beloved wife of Gary Handelman for 43 years; mother of Amy (Burt) Garland, St. Louis; Michael (Karen) Handelman of Phoenix, and David Handelman of New York. She was the daughter of Esther (the late Foster) Schlutz, Chicago, and daughter-in-law of Frieda (the late Lester) Handelman, St. Louis; sister of Leslie (Melvin Nadler), Chicago; Grandmother of Sophia, Jason and Grant Garland, St. Louis and Maya and Lila Handelman, Phoenix; sister-in-law of Howard and Alice Handelman and Neil and Natalie Handelman.
